Jose Cháfer



Jose Cháfer is a sculptor whose art is a testament to his profound connection with the natural world. Drawing inspiration from the intricate shapes, textures, and colours found in nature, he immerses himself in its cyclic essence of constant movement and transformation. This theme of evolution resonates throughout his creations, serving as a core element.

Cháfer's artistic process involves observing daily concepts and seeking patterns to achieve balance. Working primarily with natural materials like stone and wood, he values their ability to surprise and unveil hidden treasures. Through his sculptural work, Cháfer not only taps into the environment but also comprehends the underlying densities, vibrations, and textures of each material.

Guided by core values, Cháfer's art seeks to encapsulate the beauty, truth, purity, and balance he finds in both nature and life. He perceives beauty in the most profound, often overlooked aspects of existence, from harmony and balance to spontaneity and imperfections. The authenticity of natural materials aligns with his reverence for truth, allowing him to tell their life stories through his sculptures.

Purity, for Cháfer, lies in the roots and origins of things, anchoring him to his identity and the world's essence. This pursuit is embodied in the raw crackling of wood, the coolness of stones, and the aroma of coffee beans. Balance, another cornerstone, infuses his work with visual harmony, while his affinity for working with his hands and exploring space and mass contributes to his ongoing artistic evolution.

Cháfer's creations also reflect his fascination with connections, believing that all things are intricately linked. His mastery of light and shadow deepens his understanding of perception, enhancing his art's elegance and impact.

Jose Cháfer is an artist who seamlessly fuses nature's rhythms with his artistic expressions. Guided by values that revere beauty, truth, purity, and balance, his sculptures serve as a reflection of his connection to the world's profound essence. 
Thierry Martenon particularly likes to combine different techniques, shaping in wood abstract and textured forms, real receptacles to the light.




Sculpture Epicea No.200423 Blanc 2023






Walnut wood



Michel Abboud



Michel Abboud is a New York-based artist and architect known for his boundary-pushing designs and provocative projects. After earning a Masters in Advanced Architectural Design, he founded the award-winning architectural practice SOMA. Abboud has received critical acclaim and prestigious awards for his architectural work, including the World Architecture Award and the James Beard award. One of his notable projects, 45 Park Place, made him one of the youngest architects to design and execute a skyscraper in New York.

In recent years, Abboud has transitioned from architecture to art, combining the two disciplines through large-scale parametric sculptures. These sculptures are the result of 15 years of research, utilising advanced digital tools and scripting software to generate complex forms. His sculptures, such as Totem and Digital Versicolor, represent the physical embodiment of the digital world, with each three-dimensional pixel symbolising the smallest unit of a digital image. The centrality of Totem symbolises the role of technology in connecting people, while sculptures like Digital Versicolor and Pixel Tree defy traditional notions of balance and equilibrium. The sculptures, composed of meticulously arranged cubes, represent the physical embodiment of the digital world and the influence of technology on society. Despite the advanced digital tools used in their creation, Abboud's sculptures are built by hand, highlighting the artisanal nature of his work.

Abboud's artistic journey also includes painting. His debut solo show, "Unfolded," showcased paintings using high viscosity acrylic paint applied with his hands as his tools. He creates emotionally evocative works that reflect on conflict from wartorn environments, both internal and external. The folded canvas pieces explore the materiality of form and content. By manipulating the canvas through folding, Abboud challenges traditional distinctions between support and object, medium and product.


Each piece is unique, with folds that create a dynamic interplay of light and colour, further blurring the line between two-dimensional and three-dimensional art.

Mouna Rebeiz



Mouna Rebeiz is a Lebanese-Canadian painter based in London. She grew up surrounded by musicians, painters and poets, who influenced her painting.

Fascinated by the multiple facets of the human being and the human psyche, she studied psychology at the Sorbonne and at Saint Joseph University in Beirut.

She travelled extensively, and then in 1995 met Alix de la Source, a lecturer at the Louvre specialising in 18th-century painting, who taught her about the techniques of the great masters. She perfected her mastery of patinas in the Renaissance courses, and studied with Abraham Pincas, a painter and teacher at ENSBA Paris, and with Mohamed El Rawas, a Lebanese painter and engraver teaching at the fine arts school in Beirut.

In her works, both figurative and abstract, Mouna Rebeiz captures the energy of life itself, as well as the life of women, expressed at its simplest, as a universal crucible of emotions. Her great sculptures, like revisited totems, are set to the rhythms of present time in the playfulness of space.
